



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Ash Wednesday (February 22), I talked about how I like to rearrange the furniture in my house from time to time. It's almost therapeutic for me. It's a way to create a new focal point in a room. It also a way to declutter and open up space for better living. Rearranging furniture has also made room for new purposes and possibilities like when we cleared out an office space to make room for a new baby's room.

Jesus had a few words to say about rearranging furniture. Maybe not literal furniture, but he talked a lot about rearranging our lives to open up space for him, making him our priority and focal point.

For instance, in one part of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6) we hear Jesus criticizing all those who do outward displays of religiosity. He's criticizing those who pray loudly, fast, give alms/ offering and make a dramatic display while doing it. They do it ensuring everyone knows what they are doing.

Here, Jesus calls out the hypocrisy and the shallow ways people were trying to promote themselves and draw attention to themselves through religiosity during his day. Today, things aren't that different. If anything, they've gone to a whole new level. Social media has turned creating a perfect image into a norm and branding campaigns have turned it into big business.

Jesus names all the fake, hypocritical ways we continue to try to seek approval from others instead of fostering a deep, real relationship with God. Instead, he wants us to rearrange our lives and make space for our primary relationship with him. He wants us to rearrange our priorities, so that he is the focal point and the priority. When we do this, the result is that we becomes abundantly more aware of God's presence in our lives.



Many people think that Lent is about deprivation and scarcity, but that is not true. It is about returning to God's abundant love, repenting and reorienting our lives. We rearrange our lives so that they are in the shape of a cross. We focus upward and outward. Only a cross-shaped life—a life filled with loving God and neighbor-will give us abundant life.

So instead of worrying about the approval of others, we can foster the deep, true and authentic relationship Jesus wants to have with each one of us. This is what will lead to abundant life. We return to this relationship knowing that Jesus knows us fully...He gets us. No pretense is needed. May rearranging our lives to renew this relationship be the focus of our Lenten journey together.



MY FIRST DAYS AS "INTERIM" PASTOR

Let's start by defining the expression Interim: An "interim" pastor is called for a specific purpose for a period to lead a congregation during the time of transition where a new pastoral leadership is to be installed. The stability that an interim pastor brings to the moment creates the time and space necessary for a wise choice of the newly installed pastor. The apostle Paul saw his ministry as a shared ministry; He founded churches only to leave in a short time, with the work continued by others. "I planted; Apollos watered; but God gives the increase" (1 Corinthians 3:6) is a powerful motive for interim ministry.

The stability that an interim pastor brings to the moment creates the time and space necessary for a wise choice of the new pastor installed. In the Old Testament, the "wilderness" is seen as an intermediate period between the Exodus from Egypt and the entrance into the promised land. The desert is a time of danger as much as opportunity. Life is unpredictable in the wilderness, and there is always a tendency to take shortcuts to the promised destination. However, later prophets regarded the wilderness as a significant time, when Israel discovered its identity and realized its mission. Surely Jesus knew the meaning of the desert, since all His responses to temptations arose in His forty-day experience in the wilderness. It was at the end of the wilderness experience that the Israelites faced the transition from a leader, Moses, to their new leader, Joshua.

Alan G. Gripe claims that Jesus' ministry was clearly interim and itinerant. "He never established a home for himself. His active ministry spanned only three years. As he traveled through the countryside and in the towns and cities, he constantly prepared disciples to succeed him."

It is incredible that more than 25 days have passed since I began my work as an interim in the Sagrada Familia ministry of Kinsmen.

Although this has not been the first time that I've been asked to help a congregation that is left without a pastor, I want to tell you that as always I accept this work with great pleasure and much love because I do not forget the words I said on the day of my ordination; where I affirm to God and in front of many witnesses that I would do the work entrusted by Him and that I would go where God sends me.

During this time, I have found many stories of success, struggles, mistakes but above all I have witnessed great perseverance and an enormous desire to get ahead despite the changes of life and country that our immigrants have had to make. For me what I hear is nothing new because I personally identify with each of the stories and difficulties that the members of Sagrada Familia mission have gone through and continue to go through.

I understand there is so much to be done and the departure of a pastor, on any occasion, creates a whole range of emotions — sadness, anger, disorganization, depression, and grief. In this time of transition, I want to give the best of me and above all ask for the guidance of the Spirit of God to help me build good relationships and trust to continue the Work of God!!!





We are in Lent, and we want to create a space for reflection and forgiveness. For Sagrada Familia Ministry it is time to continue striving to increase and strengthen our community. On the other hand, our fundamental goal is to emphasize integration into the life of the congregation.





We have created a <u>Steering Committee</u>: to hear opinions, make decisions and keep improving. This is a committee with 7 members to help us discuss ideas and plan projects monthly.

<u>Outreach</u>: We will participate in the Chamber of Commerce event on March 7 at the mall, together with KCA, to make ourselves known to more people and promote our celebrations and events. We are planning to reconnect with nearby schools, with many Latino students, and invite them to learn about our ministry.

Trusts to Protect Children

Trusts are an excellent way to provide for the support and care of children while protecting them. Two important reasons to create a trust are to care for minor children or for a special needs child. In both circumstances, trusts can be an essential part of making plans to provide the best possible care.

Trusts for Minor Children

Parents correctly understand that a minor child is not ready to receive a substantial inheritance. Therefore, it is very common for parents to create in their will or living trust a plan to set up a trust for minor children.

The trust for minor children frequently permits the trustee broad latitude to pay income and principal to the children or spend it for their healthcare or other needs. Because of this flexibility, the trustee of the trust for minor children is frequently a family member or professional advisor for the family. After all of the children reach a particular age, the trust is then usually distributed in equal shares to the then-living children.

Special Needs Trust

A child with a disability or special need will require both a caregiver and financial resources.

During the lives of the parents, they are often able to provide the required care for a special needs child. However, after they pass away, there may need to be a more structured option that involves a special facility for that child.

To plan for the case when both parents pass away, arrangements for the care facility and financial requirements of a special needs child should be made in advance. A special needs child often has no major assets and therefore is qualified for the Social Security SSI Program or for Medicaid.

However, if the parents were to give the child an inheritance outright or a vested income stream, then those funds will all be expended before the child could receive federal benefits. As a result, the special needs trust was designed to allow parents to provide help for children, even though the child may be receiving federal or state benefits.

The key to the special needs trust is that the trustee has complete discretion over principal and income. He or she may add the income back to the trust corpus, or may make distributions to the child or for the benefit of the child.

Because the special needs trust depends on federal and state laws that regularly change, an attorney who specializes in these trusts is often used to draft the specific provisions. However, there generally are several items the trustee can provide the special needs child and still maintain his or her qualification for federal and state benefits. These include a vehicle, a home, home furnishings, property for self-support, medical care and educational expenses.
